A. T. Wallace's "The History of Cambridgeshire and Isle of Ely Smallbore Rifle Association (1909-1961)"

The Rifleman

Introduction

Our sport of small-bore target shooting, and consequently our County Association, owe their existence to the government's determination to prevent a repeat of the British Army's defeats in the Boer Wars of the late 19th century. One of the revelations of the wars was the poor standard of marksmanship in our army compared with that of the civilian Boer farmers. At home there were also doubts about the Army's ability to defend the population against invasion, and various eminent public figures and high-ranking military men, such as Major General C.E. Luard and even the Prime Minister, the Marquis of Salisbury, began to promote organisations for the training of British civilians as marksmen, using .22 'miniature' rifles. Range safety requirements for .22 shooting were easy to satisfy, compared to those for full-bore and the weapons were cheap at £1.00 or less.

General Luard enlisted the support of Lord Roberts - the hero of the Indian Mutiny and Commander in Chief of British Forces in India - and at a meeting in March 1901, chaired by the Lord Mayor of London and attended by many dignitaries and representatives of working men's organisations, the Society of Working Men's Rifle Clubs was formed. General Luard was appointed chairman and his family motto, 'Prospice' or 'Look Forward', was adopted by the Society. He explained that "the gentlemen of the country would contribute to the funds, while the working men would be expected to join the clubs and make themselves efficient in the matter of rifle shooting."

In 1903 the Society of Working Men's Rifle Clubs merged with the British Rifle League, to become the Society of Miniature Rifle Clubs; this title was retained until 1947 when it was changed to the National Small Bore Rifle Association. The Royal Crown from the British Rifle League badge was added to the Maltese cross and laurel leaves of the SWRC badge to create the badge still used by the NSRA today.

From 1907 onwards the officers of the SMRC actively encouraged the formation of County Associations, and in support of this Queen Alexandra presented the SMRC with the Queen's Cup (later to become the Queen Alexandra Cup) for competition amongst the counties of the United Kingdom. Although this was originally intended to be a competition for County Teams

of 10, there were few County Associations yet in existence and affiliated to the Society, and it was therefore difficult to organised such teams. The contest therefore started as a competition between the top individuals in each County, eventually becoming a County Team Competition for teams of 6 in 1910.

F. Shearman represented Cambridgeshire in the Queens Cup in 1908 in which he finished 5th with a score of 356 ex 400.

Our own Association was formed in 1909, but there is evidence of small-bore clubs being formed within the County in the preceding six years. These included Abington Rifle Club and the Abbey Rifle Club, based in the Newmarket Road area of Cambridge (Kimbolton was established in 1898, but was in Huntingdonshire at that time).

Alec Wallace, who with his wife Louisa (Louie) and others revived the County Association after the Second World War, wrote an excellent history in 1961, in which he identified three phases in the life of the Association, separated by the two World Wars. One might say that the Association has now entered a fourth phase, with fewer affiliated clubs than in preceding decades, but greater emphasis on coaching and raising standards and aspirations among our shooters. The 'landmarks' in the following pages are taken from Alec's work.



The First Phase (1908-1915)

1896



Sir Charles Waldstein was on the first modern Olympic organising committee in 1896 in Athens (cycling and gymnastics) and competed at the same modern Olympic Games as the oldest competitor for the American team in the military rifle event and he also claimed to unearthed the tomb of Aristotle whilst in Greece, he then became the director of the Fitzwilliam museum, he later became one of the founder members of the association in 1909.



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Leagues for Cambridgeshire clubs were organised by Mr Jack Utteridge (Lensfield Rifle club) - which were shoulder to shoulder matches on home and away ranges.

13 clubs took part including Sawston, Bell, Gas Company, Albert, Lensfield, Abbey, Saxon, Chesterteron, Romsey Town (Cantabs), Cherry Hinton (St Johns), Yeomanry, C.E.Y.M.S., and the Police. (Teams of 10).

1908

In September the Lord Lieutenant of County presented the county with a cup (Lord Viscount Clifden Cup) for miniature rifle competition. The competition took place at Chesterton Miniature Range under the same conditions as the Queen cup, 6 teams took part with Lensfield winning with a score of 1670.

1909

Rifles used were martini rifles converted by Greener a Martini rifles cost 25s and ammunition was 12/6 per 1000 rounds.



Marksman qualifying score was 370 out of 400. Originally competitions at 25 yards started off as 10 shots on a single aiming mark (like the 50 yards and 100 yards cards), then moved to 5 shots on 2 aiming marks and had moved to 1 shots on 10 aiming marks by 1915.



1909



Mr. D. L. Huddlestone presented the Huddlestone Cup for the Annual Championship Cup at County Championships. The County Association had £116 15s 6d in its account.

1915

The Activities of the Association ceased due to the First World War.

2008

The Ladies won the Women's County Competition (Charles Laws Cup) and Division 2 in the Women's Inter County League and came 3rd in the Women's long Range competition.




The County won Triangular Match and Section B of the County Cup with a score of 4638 to win the National Challenge Cup.

2007/8

The County Ladies won Division 1 of the Women's Inter County League and were runners up in the 25 yards Women's County Cup.





The Second Phase (1928-1939)

1928

In March a meeting was held in a Drill Hall in Cambridge present was Lt-General Sir A E Codrington, K.C.B (President of the Society of Miniature Rifle Clubs) Major Oliver Papworth, Mr T.S. Moore) with Major General Sir Leyton Blenkinsop, K.C.B., D.S.O acted as Chairman to invite clubs of the county to a General meeting on 6^{th} June.

In the June meeting Mr C Adeane (Lord Lieutenant of the County) was elected as President, Major General Sir Leyton Blenkinsop, K.C.B., D.S.O as Chairman, Mr E. H. Lewis as Secretary and Mr Louis Jarman as Treasurer.

At the end of the first year 6 clubs had affiliated shooting in two divisions: the University, the Gas Company Rifle Club, the Territorials, Abington, the R. A. F., Duxford and the Perse School.

1929

The reformed Association held its first open shoot on the University O.T.C open range at Grange Road on 23rd May. The individual entry was 1 shilling whilst the team entry was 2 shillings per team of 3. The championship was won by Mr E. A. Marsh (Cambridge University) with a score of 291 ex 300 at 25, 50 and 100 yards to win the Paget Cup. Mr Marsh also won the county championship in 1930 and 1931.

At the end 1929/30 8 clubs had affiliated to the Association and the financial balance for the end of the year was £4.15.9d, the National Association gave the association £4.00 thus the Association made 1s 9d.

1929

Major Oliver Papworth is made President of the Association, which he held until his death in 1933.

1932

Mrs Scott (Cambridge Rifle Club) was the first women to shoot in a county team.

Mr Henry Yool (university) won the County Championship at Duxford (he sent donations to the prize fund and helped at later County Championship meetings).



The County Championship took place at Grange Road Range. The final placing had to be separated by the number of cartons at 100 yards. Mr D.A. Lloyd won with a score of 295 and Mr H. Yool second with 295 (but one less carton.



The County Ladies won the Women's 50 metres competition at Bisley (they were last in 1992).



Susan Day won the County Championship to become the first women to win the Championship (she also has shot for Wales in the Home Internationals and the Commonwealth Games and for Great Britain in the Randal Match).

Sandra Haskett qualifies for the final of the British Long Range Championship (Earl Roberts) and shot for Great Britain in the Randal Match (with Sharon McGregor) in 2006 and the Dewar Match in 2007. Sandra was the English Ladies Captain at Bisley in 2008.

The County Ladies won the Women's County Competition (The Charles Laws Cup) breaking the British record for the competition which they broken in 2007 but ended up runner up as Surrey had the same score but had more tons (100). The Ladies finished 4^{th} in the Women's Long Range Competition.





1939

There were only 10 affiliated clubs at the end of the second phase of the Association: Cambridge, Abington, The University, Wisbech, March, City of Ely, the Gas Company, and the Leys School.

The Second World War ended the activities in the second phase.

The Third Phase (1946 onwards)

1943

The 5^{th} Battalion (now the Gogs) started to run Battalion Home Guard team leagues this league wound up in 1947 and merged with the County Association, with the following cups being donated to the Association The Bebbington Cup, Pointer Cup, Pointer Memorial Cup, Lake Cup, Weatherhead Cup, Marfly Cup (Marshall Cup) and the Chivers Cup.

1946

When the Association reformed on 6^{th} March the following was elected President Mr B N Bebbington, Chairman Mr J. E. Jackson, Secretary Mr A T Wallace, Match Secretary Mr C.G. Tilley, Treasurer Mr G R Crowe, Captain Mr G Griffin, Vice Captain Mr H Wiles.

At the Cambridge League and County Association dinner there were 175 people present.

Cambridge ladies club was formed (one of few in the country).

The first championship of this phase was held at Barton Road in June.

1946/47 County ran its first winter league of this phase with 20 "teams of 5" from 11 clubs, however shooting had to be suspended due to the lighting being cut off to conserve electricity.

The Association changed its name to:

"The Cambridgeshire and Isle of Ely Smallbore Rifle Association".

At the County Championships the First lady Champion, Mrs. H. Jones was presented with the Marfly Cup.

2001

Neil Day won the Grand aggregate and in 2002 with a score of 2753 out of 2800 in 2002. He also won 11 National trophies at Bisley in 2002.



2002

Neil day won a gold medal (1189) in the 50 metre prone pairs in the Manchester Commonwealth games. Neil Later won the County Champions Championship at Bisley.

2004

Cambridgeshire won the 6 Counties. 1000 Tenex costs £130 and Match costs £84, and ten 10-spot 25 yards targets costs £1.00.

2005

Neil Day won the British Long-Range Championship (The Earl Roberts) scoring 777 out of 800 then 193 in a tie shoot. The county won the Minor Section of the County Cup with a score of 3829 out of 4000.

2000

Neil day won the NSRA 50 British ISSF 50 metre prone competition he wins it again in 2003. The County won Division 3 of the Inter County League and won the Triangular Match.

1947

JW Kerridge shot for England in the Home Countries at Perth in 1947 scoring 280.

The match was 10 shots at 25, 50 and 100yds. The result was Scotland won with 2933, England 2921, Ireland 2806.

Mr Kerridge scored a possible in the Friday 25yds Sweepstake competition,

1948

There were 140 entries in the County Championship, and there were over 200 people at the Association dinner at the Lion hotel in Cambridge and $G \to G$ E Griffin shot for England in the Home Countries at Largs.

1949

The Association won its first Inter County League by winning Division 5 (Captain-Mr Leslie Walsh). The five bull target was replaced with a ten bull target.


 5^{th} Bn. H.G. Club (Gogs) won all 5 of the team competitions at the County Championships (Cambridge had won all 5 in 1928 and Shelford in 1959).



Cambridgeshire won Division 3 of the Inter County League winning all 7 rounds with an average score for the 20 shooters of 1962.28.

200 guests attended the Annual dinner held on the $3^{\rm rd}$ May. At the dinner Mr. A.J, Palmer presented Lord Swansea with the Individual Welsh Championship.

Lord Swansea won the Paget cup to become County Champion (and 1952) he later competed in 5 commonwealth Games winning a gold medal (394) in the 1966 Commonwealth Games in the fullbore and a silver medal (374) in 1982. Lord Swansea also won the Bisley Full Bore Grand Aggregate in 1957 and 1960 and came second in the "Queen Prize" twice and shot for Wales in the NSRA Home Countries in 1951.



1951

Winchester and Remington rifles become available from America changing the sport to a more scientific and technical one.

1955

Mrs L Wallace scored 200 (25 and 50 yards) in the time limit competition (100 at each distance).


1998

The County Association changed its name to:

"The Cambridgeshire Target Shooting Association".

The County won Division 4 of the Inter County League and won the Minor Section of the BSA Cup with a score of 1950 out of 2000, they also won the triangular Match with a score of 15235 out of 16000 and the Junior Reserves won their division of the Junior Inter County Reserve League.

Neil Day won a Silver Medal in the 50 metre prone pairs with Phil Scanlon (1188) in the Malaysian Commonwealth games. Neil Day also won the Queen Alexandra individual competition at Bisley with a score of 408.



The County came 3^{rd} in the Queen Alex cup with score 2346 (Surrey were first with 2376)

1957

H. Beaumont won the County Championship with a score of 396 out of 400 (2 points below the record) on July 28^{th} on his first appearance at the small bore event, which completed his double as he was already the County's full bore championship.



1958

The "National Classification" was introduced where shooters shot in 4 classes (A, B, C and D Class). The County won the Inter County League for a second time (Captain was T. A. Wallace).

The Triangular Match for the Kirkwood Cup is shot for between Cambridgeshire, Norfolk and Suffolk at Newmarket open range (Dewar course at 50 and 100 yards teams of 20) on May 18^{th.}
Cambridgeshire won (captain was T. A. Wallace) with a score of 7760, Norfolk 7752 and Suffolk 7703.

County Championship was held at Barton Road range using the new National classification and targets. There were 108 competitors, with Louie Wallace wining the County Ladies Championship with a score of 835.



Mr. R Stevenson winning the County Championship with a score of 864.



1995

The County won the Triangular Competition for the third time in a row with a score of 3228 out of 4000, Norfolk 3195 out of 4000 and Suffolk 3163 out of 4000.

1996

The County Reserves win Division 4 of the County Inter Reserves League.

The County Ladies came second in the Women's 50 metre Competition at Bisley and the County won the Triangular match with a score of 11478 out of 1200 (Linda Cocksedge scoring 590 out of 600).



1997

The County Juniors won the Division 5 of the Junior Inter County League. The County opened it new range at Yaxley. Neil Day won the County Championship at the First County Championship held on the Yaxley Range near Norman Cross, with a score of 783 out of 800. The County also hosted and won the Triangular Match for the first time at Yaxley.

The Inter County Reserves won Division 4 of the Inter reserve league.

1986

Terry Turner won a Gold medal in the Rapid Pistol Team event at the Edinburgh Commonwealth Games with a score of 1169 out of 1200. John Pearman shot in the Wolverhampton 100 metres shoot and broke the World record scoring 997 out of 1000.

The Association was know as:

"The Cambridge Rifle and Pistol Association."

The Association officially required the range at Orton Longueville, which Hanson later brought (1997) and repliced with the range at Yaxley. The County team came 4^{th} in the County 50 metre competition at Bisley and won the minor Counties Cup with John Pearman scoring 398.

1987

The County won Division 4 of the Inter County League. Cambridgeshire also won the Triangular Match (the first time since 1958) with a score of 3405 out of 4000, Norfolk 3354 out of 4000 and Suffolk 3181 out of 4000.

1992

Cambridgeshire came 2^{nd} in the Minor Section of the BSA Competition with a score 1846 out of 2000 and finished 3^{rd} in 1993 (1843 out of 2000).

1993

The County won Division 5 of the Inter County League and the County won the Triangular Match.

1994

The County won the Triangular Competition dropping 1009 points with Suffolk dropping 1084 points and won the Minor Section of the BSA Cup scoring 1956 out of 2000, with John Pearman scoring 200 out of 200.

1958

Nigel Oakley scored 396 (world record) at the 37^{th} World Championships in Moscow winning an individual and team gold medal in the 50 metres 40 shot prone competition. This was the first time Great Britain had won medals in the small bore events.



1960

Roger Reeves (Shelford) won the County Championship with a record score of 681 out of 700.



Cambridgeshire won their Division in the Inter County Championship (Captain Mr A J Johnson) and the Reserves won their Division of the Inter County Reserve League. B N Beddington was elected as president of the Association and Mr G E Tribe was elected as county Secretary.

Anschutz Model 54 (supermatch) cost £86 10s. and Shooting jackets cost £5.12.6d.

1962

The cost of ammunition was 8/1 per 50 rounds.

1965

In April the geographical County of Cambridgeshire and Ely be came a County Council Authority. The County Arms badge changed - to the one we used in the late 60's to 70's.



1965

The NSRA change the rules on trigger weights with the minimum trigger weight was changed from 3lb to 1.1lb. (However for safety reasons the NSRA stressed that triggers did not need to change to the lighter weight).

1966

Anthony J Chivers came 4^{th} in the 50 Free Pistol Competition at the Kingston Commonwealth Games with a score of 534.

1982

John Pearman won the Earl Roberts at Bisley to become British Champion one of only a few that have won the short range and long range British Championship





John Pearman won the Individual "News of the World" competition to become the Short Range British Champion. John also won in 1983 scoring 400 out of 400.



1967

Doug Mottram shot for England.

1968

The County Ladies won all their matches to win Division 4 of the Women's Inter County Leagues and the County team won Division 4 of the Inter County League.

1969

1000 Tenex costs £8-8s-0d, 1000 Match costs £6 0s 0d, and ten 10-spot 25 yards targets costs 5 d.

1970

The NSRA introduced a new shooting class for the 100 shooters in the county called "X Class". Only J. W. Baker from Cambridgeshire was amongst the top 100 selected X Class in 1970, in 2009 Cambridgeshie has 8 members who are nationally classed as X Class: Linda Blake, David Calvert, Will Cowell, Neil Day, Brian Inglis, Sharon McGregor, Nick Penn and Ken Welsh.



Leagues were disrupted by power cuts caused by the coal strike, in 1971 the postal strike caused problems; however on both years all cards were shot and scored. The County Ladies won Division 5 of the Inter County Women's League wining all the rounds.

1000 rounds of Tenex cost £.10.80.

1974

Robin Pizer won the Paget Cup to become the county champion; he later became chairman of the National Rifle Association in 2009.

In April the County of Cambridgeshire was formed merging the Counties of Cambridgeshire and Ely with Huntingdonshire.

1976

The County Association started using the current Badge and the County Association was known as:

"The Cambridgeshire Small bore Rifle and Pistol Association".



1979

The cost of a rifle ranges from £30 for a second-hand rifle to £450 for a new top of the range International rifle.

1981

John Pearman scored 100 out of 100 on all ten rounds of the Inter County League to gain an average of 100. John also shot for England and Great Britain in the Dewar team that year and in 1982, 1983, 1984, 1990.



1981

John Pearman shot for Great Britain in the Pershing Match. The pershing match is shot against the Americans at Camp Perry, the match takes place once every $8\ \text{years}$.
